### **Infocomm Club**

On 29<sup>th</sup> June 2017, Infocomm CCA members took part in the 3<sup>rd</sup> National Coding Competition, which was jointly organised by Springfield Secondary School and Regent Secondary School. The event held at Regent Secondary School and saw participation of 222 students from 32 primary schools, making up a total of 57 teams.

The Coding Competition aims to provide Primary School students with the opportunity to develop their interest in game design using the SCRATCH computer programme. This year's theme was on Cloud computing. There were 2 stages in the competition. In Stage 1 (Pre-Coding), students were required to send in their documentation and screen shot their game's interface, in order to show how their game worked. In Stage 2, they were then required to write the codes on the spot.

- Do his woodwork project for him so he can get an A for it.
- Debate with his teacher for one more mark so he goes one grade up.
- Fly to school with your child's homework when he forgets to bring it.

- May hinder your child from becoming independent, savvy and street-smart?
- May make your child think he isn't good enough, and raise his anxiety level?



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**Why not help your children fly on their own instead?**

**Let them...**

**Do their own homework**  
Help them think through and arrive at the solutions, without feeding them the answers.
